The GCH Software Toolkit # When a golf history group at a golf club gets established one of the first decisions is about how the collection of objects, documents and images will be recorded. One option is for a database, and Mosaics is preferred for objects whereas Archive Manager is better for documents. These systems are too complex for part-time computer users and a simpler option is Image Master for photographs. With encouragement from the AGHS Historians Group, one golf club history group is working with a software specialist to see if a GCH software toolkit can be developed, with supporting IT services as needed. Publishing a Golf Club History :: A companion to the Writing booklet has been produced for AGHS by Longueville Media. It can be downloaded from the AGHS website later in June.

Postcards and Golf

BOWRIL GOLF GINGS

Postcards offer a means of writing a short informal message and posting it to a friend, often at a reduced letter rate. They are popular with tourists, providing a souvenir of a place the tourist has visited.

As souvenirs, postcards often carry a photograph of an interesting feature of a town.



Golf attire has evolved somewhat over time. This early 1920s postcard of the Hamilton GC Victoria, typifies the dress of the day and style of clubbonse.


The practice of agistment was common on our early country courses. Putting greens were protected from grazing sheep, cattle and horses. This Bowral NSW postcard is postmarked 1911.

Today, while postcards are still popular, they have largely been superseded by e-mail and SMS texting. However, collecting postcards, particularly old ones, grows and grows as a popular hobby. It is a fascinating and informative hobby. Collectors usually focus on particular places or topics. Naturally, the author of this article has a special interest in golf postcards. They give us an insight — sometimes a unique insight — into the history of our great game. Australian golf postcards prior to the 1930s are somewhat elusive.

The sample here of three cards illustrates just how fascinating the hobby can be.
